

# BB'S MOSTLY GEMS OLD AND NEW

## Tunes in an Irish traditional style

Welcome to the BB Mostly Gems Old and New online tunebook. I like to think there's a lot of good stuff in here and I hope you enjoy the search for "that tune" (or "those tunes") that really appeal to you. I know they're in here somewhere!

There are a number of ways of accessing the material in this book, and I'll provide details for you here. Everything is made to be as "user friendly" as possible.

For example, if you're interested in a quick look at the notation pages, just scroll down from here. Or use the Thumbnails (see below) or do a "Go To Page" search. All easy.

As of now, notation for the first tune (#1) is on page 20. The last tune (#362) is on page 381. (These numbers will change if/when tunes or new "front of the book" pages are added.)

Feel free to experiment with opening the sound files and the notation files simultaneously - your browser may have a command that will allow you to accomplish this. Or you can simply use two browsers - whatever works.

#### DOWNLOAD:

The contents of this book must be downloaded before any of its functions will work.

You can download either the entire book or individual pages from your browser. Since my browser (Firefox) and yours might work differently, I don't want to give detailed instructions that might work for one but not the other. Remember: you can always experiment without the danger of disturbing the original material!

#### **THUMBNAILS:**

If you download the entire volume, I strongly suggest enabling the "Show Thumbnails" function in your PDF viewer. Because of the additional pages at the front of the book, the tune numbers and page numbers don't match, so "tune 224" is NOT the same as "printing page 224". <u>Always</u> use the thumbnail number for printing.

#### "DUH" Dept.

- (1) The sound file link won't work once you put the tune on paper! But you can always access the sound file either via the Index (recommended) or via the stand-alone URL (for geniuses). More info below.
- (2) No matter what you do good or bad you can't affect the master file as it exists on the server. You can only make changes to what you've downloaded. If you foul something up known to happen just return to <a href="https://www.capeirish.com/bb-tunebook">www.capeirish.com/bb-tunebook</a>.pdf and start over.

#### THE INDEX:

To find a particular tune (= "search" mode to us web-savvy types) use the Index provided at the beginning of the volume. Each tune title is linked to the appropriate PDF file; clicking on the tune title opens the MP3 in another tab.

The Index also contains links to the sound file and to the ABC file.

Since my system uses file numbers instead of tune names, it would be difficult to find a particular PDF, MP3, or ABC file without using the Index. If you do know the file number, you can easily find its PDF, MP3, or ABC using these stand-alone file paths:

In both these cases, <xxxxx> represents the file number (4 to 6 digits). (Don't use the brackets - they're for demonstration purposes only!)

#### "BACK TO THE INDEX"

If you're somewhere in the book and want to get back to the Index, you can do a "Go To Page . . ." search and type in "7". Why "7"? Well, there are actually 15 pages in the present Index, but 7 will get you back to a point where you can navigate up or down to find what you want. Again, this works once the book is downloaded.

Also: since the Index pages also show up in the Thumbnails, you can always click on a likely-looking one and go from there.

#### STAND-ALONE VERSIONS OF THE INDEX:

There are two of these:

- the HTML

(http://www.capeirish.com/ittl/tunefolders/12/12-table.html) will open in your browser and its links will be usable.

- the Excel version

(http://www.capeirish.com/ittl/tunefolders/12/12-table-sortable.xlsx.zip) has to be downloaded first. Any spreadsheet program should be able to open it thereafter.

The Excel version is sortable, meaning that the user can arrange the entries in whatever way is most suitable (e.g. tune type, key).

#### **NEW MATERIAL:**

As of 19 May 2024 there are 362 tunes in this volume. As of 19 May 2025, there may be 462 (unlikely but who knows?) The Index and links will always be updated as new tunes are added. If you've already downloaded "the 362", you can easily download the new tunes individually.

To know if there's new material, check the update date at the top of the Index page. If it's different from 5/19/24, it indicates that some new tunes have been added. These will appear at the bottom of the Index table (with the dates added after the titles). I might add a few \*\*\* in that cell to make it more attention-getting!

A polite reminder that all material in this book is copyrighted. Fair use (sessions, concerts) requires no permission, but attribution is always appreciated.

Specific permission to record this material must be obtained first.


## [1] AFTER the BLIZZARD

## [2] ALICE by the WINDOW (hornpipe)







## [14] The BAWNARD Slide



## [17] BEANS in the POT (polka)




## [32] The BOYS at BOLAND'S MILL (hornpipe)


### [49] CHICKEN in the BUCKET

## [117] The HAPPY HAMSTER




# [315] WHITE LIGHTNING, MY ASS!



# [320] JIM BOYCE'S HORNPIPE





# [322] The CANAL BRIDGES



# [324] The EAST END JETTY (reel)




# [334] The MIDLETON LASS


# [359] DANCING at DAVOLL'S (hornpipe)




