AFTER THE BLIZZARD	12001	JIG	D	I don't recall exactly which blizzard this tune is named for - we don't get them all that often on Cape Cod, but when we DO get one, it can be an interesting experience for a few days. Fair play to the local authorities - they usually get the roads back to almost normal within a day or so (power outages maybe not so quickly).
ALICE BY THE WINDOW	12002	H'PIPE	D	This was an 80th birthday tune for the 'grande dame' of traditional music on Cape Cod, Alice van Buren. "By the window" refers to the fact that that's where she liked to sit playing her mandolin during sessions. After a long battle with dementia, Alice passed away in 2015.
ANDREA'S	12003	H'PIPE	A	This tune was composed as a raffle prize and a nice lady named Andrea was the winner. I don't recall how much we raised or even who the beneficiary was, but I hope the winner enjoyed her tune!
ANDY BROOKS'	12004	REEL	Dm	This is an early tune that goes back to the golden days of IRTRAD Irish traditional mailing list that was a really lively spot for many years before "social media" came along. Andy was the son of Jann Brooks, a fine singer who was living in Canada when last I heard.
ANGEL AT THE GIG	12352	REEL	G	Part of "Tracy's Trilogy". Tracy Gallagher passed away peacefully at home while our trad group "Cat's Melodeon" were performing onstage at a local festival. The title reflects the feeling that we all had when we heard the news - that we did indeed have "an angel at our gig"!
ANNE & ALAN'S	12349	H'PIPE	D	This "family tune" is for our nephew Alan and his partner Anne, both proud Dubliners who did a great job of keeping an eye on the older folks during the pandemic.
ANNE DERRANE'S	12005	REEL	G	It used to be well known in traditional circles that the virtuoso box player Joe Derrane had died some time in the 1960s or 1970s. I thought so too until my wife and I sat at the same table with a very much alive Joe and his wife Anne at a wedding in 1990! Unfortunately both Joe and Anne are gone now - Anne first, then Joe in July 2016.
ARDFINNAN BRIDGE	12006	REEL	Bm	Ardfinnan is a pleasant little town in Tipperary. The bridge crosses the River Suir and is the "old rustic bridge by the mill" that the song commemorates.
ARNOLD'S DUCK	12007	JIG	D	Many of the older residents of our strange little town know the real story of Arnold's Duck, but none of them will ever speak of it to outsiders - especially if they look like musicians
BALLYBAY TAILOR	12008	JIG	G	A "thank you" tunes for Peadar Murnane, at the time the "unofficial" town historian who was kind enough to assist me in locating my "roots" (which turned out not to be in Ballybay anyway!)
BALLYCONEELY	12009	JIG	Α	Ballyconeely is a village way out in Connemara, about as far west in Ireland as you can get!
BALTRASNA	12010	REEL	D	Dedicated to fiddler and long-time traditional music supporter Tony Smith and his family.
BANAGHER BRIDGE	12340	JIG	D	Banagher Bridge is a landmark some 8 miles from Martin Mulhaire's home town of Eyrecourt. It crosses the Shannon River between Counties Galway and Offaly, "The present bridge, constructed between 1841 and 1843 has six masonry arches." (< Wikipedia)
BARKING SEAL	12011	JIG	G	There's an aquarium nearby where a couple of noisy seals ("Bumper" and "Luseal") used to live. When they wanted to be fed, you could hear the carry-on half a mile away They always drew a big crowd around feeding time and they really seemed to love the attention! Sadly both creatures have crossed the Rainbow Bridge to Seal Heaven (# lots of tasty fish and other seals to play with).
BASS RIVER	12012	H'PIPE	D	This tune started life as "The Bubbling Stream", then became "The Kingfisher" - both of which titles, as I found out subsequently, had already been used. I finally gave it the present name after one of our local watercourses (after checking Tune Finder to make sure this name too hadn't been used before!)
BATTLING JERRY	12013	JIG	G	This tune was composed for fiddler Jerry Holland, a battler indeed as he struggled against cancer. He lost the battle in July 2009 but his legacy lives on in many ways. I had the privilege of playing backup for him at a pub concert on the Cape a couple years before he died. I had never played with him, or even met him for that matter, and due to traffic he arrived just before the show so we never got a chance to practice together. But the show went off without a hitch (I'm still not sure how!)
BAWNARD SLIDE	12014	SLIDE	D	Bawnard is a little town in Kerry near the southern edge of the Sliabh Luachra area. There don't seem to be any other tunes named for it, so maybe this is the first! (If it isn't, we can add "#2" to the name!)
BEACH AVENUE RAMBLE	12335	H'PIPE	G	Beach Avenue is a street in the Bronx which is notable for not much in particular, except for the fact that my wife Pat once lived there. As if that's not exciting enough, box player Luke O'Malley did too. Although they were totally unknown to one another coincidence is well, coincidental. But still - isn't it a small world? (Insert cliché emoji here.)

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BEACH HOUSE	12015	REEL	Ador	Named for a Cape Cod venue where our "Cat's Melodeon" group had some nice sessions a few years back. It has changed hands recently and it's now an Italian restaurant that seems to be doing well.
BEAL BOCHT (Poor Mouth)	12016	REEL	Em	A tribute to the great writer Flann O'Brien, to my thinking one of the funniest men ever to put pen to paper. The name "Poor Mouth" refers to Mr. O'Brien's wonderful parody of the 1930's Irish "native speaker" novels much admired (for the wrong reasons, according to O'Brien) by the "glitterati" of the time.
BEANS IN THE POT	12017	POLKA	С	This tune was originally intended to fill what I perceived as the trad repertoire's crying need for a polka in the key of C. Problem is that I never liked it in that key so I present it here (with a few amendments) in D.
BEARS OF BAFFIN	12018	H'PIPE	Em	Everybody loves polar bears - who wouldn't love a creature so big and furry and white who could kill you with one swipe of his or her enormous paw? But hey - the cubs are adorable, right? Just don't mess with them while Mom is around
BEAUTIES OF BROCKTON	12019	JIG	D	Brockton is a blue-collar town southwest of Boston, once a thriving manufacturing and mill town but now not much of anything, its two famous native sons are the champion boxer Rocky Marciano and the late great fiddler Jerry Holland. I should point out that a branch of the musical Reynolds clan lives there too, which is definitely a point in Brockton's favor.
BEST OF THE BANNER	12020	REEL	G	Dedicated to the memory of Mary Keating and Nora Flanagan, both fine ladies from the "Banner County" of Clare, whose families have done so much for the tradition in the New York area.
BETTY ANN DALY'S	12021	JIG	G	Named for a good friend, fine lady, and the mother of several excellent musicians. She and her family were among the first people to welcome us to Falmouth when we relocated to the Cape from New York around 1980.
BEV & THE REAPER	12022	H'PIPE	D	A few (?) years back a fellow musician had a serious medical issue. Fortunately she came through the experience in one piece!
BIG (*) DEAL	12023	POLKA	G	Composed in January 2000, after we had miraculously lived through the Y2K hoo-hah (remember that?) The * stands for whatever your favorite disparaging adjective might be. (I know what MY personal choice would be, but this tune collection is meant for family use).
BIG THREE-FOUR	12024	WALTZ	D	A tune in three-four time for a 34th wedding anniversary - cute, huh? (With all my love to Mrs. Black - here's hoping for 34 more!) Update: 56 (or LVI as the NFL would put it) as of September 2025. Still as madly in love as a couple of senior citizens can be. (But I'm not gonna rename the tune.)
BIG WHITE BOAT	12336	SLIDE	D	Dedicated to the crew and shore staff of the ferry "Island Queen", which does summer runs between Falmouth on Cape Cod and Oak Bluffs on Martha's Vineyard. "IQ" was my summer employer for the past 12 years! (In case you're interested - and why wouldn't you be? - I served as a "vehicle placement counsellor", i.e. parking lot attendant.)
BILL FLYNN'S	12025	JIG	G	Bill was a local entertainer and friend of the tradition who passed away in November 2011 after a long illness. RIP.
BILL GLEESON'S (Wooden Wedding)	12026	REEL	G	Bill Gleeson, to whose memory this tune is dedicated, passed away in September 2009. Bill was a kind and intelligent man capable of discussing any number of Irish topics. His public claim to fame was his recitation at sessions of a piece called "Clancy's Wooden Wedding". Delivered in Bill's gravelly voice, it never failed to bring the house down!
BILL McEVOY'S FANCY	12027	H'PIPE	D	Bill McEvoy (RIP 2020) was well known to anyone involved with traditional music in the US. He received many honors and accolades for his efforts on behalf of the music over the years, and I'd like to add this tune to the list!
BITTERSWEET	12028	REEL	D	Bittersweet is a vine which puts out bright red and yellow leaves and berries in the Fall. It belongs to the Celastraceae family (as if you didn't already know that!) You see it everywhere - it's certainly pretty but (scary chord please) it has a sinister side - besides being poisonous, it can choke its host tree to death! (Insert 'eeewww' here.) Botanists refer to it as an "invasive species", meaning it came from elsewhere and settled here (which describes about 85 of the local human inhabitants of Cape Cod as well, but at least most of us don't go around choking trees).
BLACK ROAD TO LOUGHREA	12029	REEL	Dm	A salute to the musicians of East Galway and their great D minor tunes. The name refers to the road that crosses the mountains between Ballinakill and Loughrea - as lonely a stretch of road as I've ever driven on. That was years ago - even in these days of ubiquitous smartphones, Onstar, GPS, etc., you certainly wouldn't want to get a flat tire up there!
BLACKSTONE VALLEY	12030	H'PIPE	G	For Bob, Russell, and the other folks who have worked so hard over the years to keep the BV Festival alive!
BOATLOAD OF HERRING	12333	REEL	D	For fiddler Tessie Stokinger and her granddad (and Northeast Ceili Band charter member) Pat Reynolds, who works as a fish-truck driver (or a "marine provision specialist", as his resumé might put it - if he had one).
BOX IN THE BASEMENT (Lucky Mike's)	12345	JIG	G	Most musicians that I know have had a beautiful dream in which they come across an instrument of incredible value, or a collection of rare and wonderful instruments (in top condition, of course) (this is also known as "The Banjo Player's Fantasy" but it could apply to anyone). Well, it actually happened to Mike the box player when one of his relatives found such a gem in her basement. "Lucky Mike" still can't believe it happened!

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BOY GENIUS	12031	REEL	G	The original inspiration for this tune (and a few more in this collection) was the movie
				"Amadeus", probably my all-time favorite. In my not-so-humble opinion, every musician should see it (even if you're not crazy about Mozart or classical music in general).
BOYS AT BOLAND'S MILLS	12032	H'PIPE	G	Boland's Mill, formerly Dublin's flour mill and a city landmark for many years, is situated in the Ringsend area of Dublin between center city and the bay. One of the first battles of the 1916 Easter Uprising was fought there. My wife's grandfather was one of the combatants. The mill shut down in 2001, and like many other of Dublin's older buildings mill complex has been "re-purposed" for mixed residential/commercial use.
BOYS OF BELLHARBOUR	12364	REEL	D	Composed in honor of the Droney brothers of Clare - Christopher, James, John, Patrick, and Frank. Great fans of everything Irish. May they rest in peace.
BRANT POINT	12033	JIG	D	I wrote this tune shortly after we returned from playing at a wedding on Nantucket, which is where the Brant Point lighthouse is. We didn't get to see much of the island but it certainly looks like a nice place to spend some time (and money, lots of it, especially in the summer).
BRAVE LADS OF TYRONE	12034	REEL	A	I was working on a project a while back that required me to find one dance tune for each of the 32 counties of Ireland (e.g., "Dublin Porter", "Galway Rambler", "Cork Hornpipe", "Sligo Maid" - you get the idea.) I was amazed to discover that there were no dance tunes that included "Tyrone" in the title - at least I couldn't find any. (There is a tune called "Tyrone's Ditches" but it's a march.)
BRAVE YOUNG BRIAN (Brian the Brave)	12035	JIG	G	This tune was originally named "Brian the Brave" until I found out that name had already been used for a tune in the Roche collection. Oops The Brian of my title is a young man who had to overcome a lot of adversity early in his life, but never gave up and has done quite well for himself - a good example of bravery indeed. (Note that Brian's proud dad Larry Jr. likes the original name, so it's included here!)
BREEZE ACROSS THE LAKE	12036	JIG	G	Pick your favorite lake - lots of lovely ones up in the Adirondacks, or just around the bend in Ireland - but I didn't have any particular one in mind! (On Cape Cod they're "ponds" unless you can't see to the other side - THEN they're "lakes"!)
BROKEN BOW	12037	H'PIPE	G	This tune is named for a street in our former home town of Falmouth, unremarkable except for the fact that some very nice people closely related to me live there. Not sure where the name comes from - it might have some historical significance (or not).
BRYANT'S BARBECUE	12038	REEL	Am	If you're ever in Kansas City (Missouri), make sure you pay a visit to Arthur Bryant's barbecue place downtown (on Brooklyn Avenue!). No question that it's some of the best barbecue you'll ever try. The place is always smoky and noisy and crowded - in other words, definitely worth the trip! (PS - if you're fussy, you might want to bring your own napkins.)
BUCKET O' NAILS	12039	POLKA	D	Someone on IRTRAD (the now-moribund-but-not-totally-dead traditional Irish music mailing list, may its name be blessed forever) once described yours truly as "funny as a bucket of nails" after I had shared one of my usual inanities. In his part of the world (I believe he's English) that's not necessarily a compliment, but I thought it would make a good tune title anyway. (Look, I'll take titles wherever I can get them!)
CAMEL'S HUMP	12040	REEL	Em	An quasi-Arabic scale with an Irish tune structure - what's not to like? (Note to backup players: the "E" chord can be "E5", i.e. E and B with no G or G#).
CANAL BRIDGES	12322	JIG	Bm	Since June 2014 we have lived along the banks of the Cape Cod Canal - between the Railroad Bridge and the Bourne Bridge - and we're enjoying it thoroughly. To watch the tides and currents of the Canal in their daily rhythms is to understand the meaning of James Joyce's reference to the "everchanging never-changing" nature of the sea. There are two elderly highway bridges spanning the Canal that will be replaced within the next ten years (or so they say) - hope we're around to see the new ones (doubtful).
CANALSIDE WALTZ	12331	WALTZ	D	This is the instrumental portion of "The Cape Cod Canal Shantata" that I wrote for the New Bedford Sea Shanty Chorus.
CAPE COD	12041	H'PIPE	A	Have fun with this - maybe play the parts in reverse order the second time ("Donegal" style)!
CAROL & SID'S (The Pinebrook)	12348	WALTZ	A	Another "anniversary" waltz, this one for our niece Carol and her husband Sid, celebrating forty years of domesic bliss thia year (2022). It doesn't make us feel any younger to recall that Carol was flower girl at our wedding(By the way each of their kids - Steven, Jennie, and Emma - has his or her own tune in this collection.) I
CAROLINE'S FANCY	12042	POLKA	A	For Caroline Doherty Roddy, a good friend and a very talented lady, known and loved in the Boston area and beyond.
CASH IN HAND	12043	JIG	A	To commemorate a trad musician's favorite form of compensation.
CASTLE VIEW	12044	JIG	Am	Our friend Seán O'Driscoll, a fine banjo & box player, lived in Minneapolis for some years but is now back in Cork. Seán grew up in Blarney in a house called "Castle View", apparently because you can't see the famous castle from it (at least I couldn't, but maybe I wasn't looking in the right direction). But it's a good name for a tune. (Travel tip: Blarney Castle is worth a visit, but never EVER kiss the famous Stone. I won't go into detail, but - you've been warned!)
CHALK AND CHEESE	12045	REEL	С	Dedicated with much love to our two sons, Tedd and Chris WE know they're brothers but they sure don't look it!
CHAMBERS OF MELODY	12046	JIG	Em	Dedicated to Boston musician and computer tech John Chambers, responsible for the great "TuneFinder" program that has been so helpful to so many musicians.

CHENANGO COUNTY	12048	H'PIPE	A	Chenango County is a lovely area in the "southern tier" of New York State, close to the Pennsylvania state line. It's very quiet and very agricultural. I have "roots" there so I might be a little partial!
CHICKEN IN THE BUCKET	12049	JIG	G	Our piper friend Colin showed up for a gig on Martha's Vineyard carrying his pipes plus a huge bucket of Kentucky Fried Chicken plus all the trimmings. He explained that since the locals on MV aren't crazy about fast-food chains, his in-laws who live there asked him to "import" some KFC from the "other side". Being a dutiful son-in-law, he did so, but handling a pipe case and a load of fried chicken on the ferry was more of a challenge than he thought! (The rest of us offered to help, but I don't think he trusted us with the chicken.)
CHIPMUNK'S HOUSE	12050	JIG	D	There was a colony (pod? flock? gaggle?) of chipmunks (aka "timber tigers") living near us that we always had fun watching. They're feisty little critters who occasionally show signs of a sense of humor. Watching them scoot around on their mysterious errands can really brighten a day!
CHRISTINA REID'S	12051	JIG	A	Named with love for one of the "angels of Dublin" (and sister of Rosie of "Rosie Rogers' Fling", elsewhere in this collection) - as the saying goes, their like will not be seen again.
CHRISTMAS AT THE MAHERS'	12052	S/JIG	G	Fiddler and dance teacher Aidan Maher and his lovely wife Gerry are transplanted Dubliners now living in the Boston area. Aidan happens to like slip jigs and is never shy about playing a few at a session!
CHRISTMAS IN JULY	12053	REEL	D	When you've been waiting for someone for a long time, and then she finally arrives, it's Christmas regardless of what the calendar says!
CLARA MOUNTAIN	12054	SLIDE	D	Clara Mountain overlooks Millstreet, a pleasant little town on the Cork side of the Sliabh Luachra area so well-known to traditional music lovers for its great players of slides and polkas.
CLASSICAL	12055	H'PIPE	Dm	Another tune inspired by that great movie "Amadeus". (Note: the upper notes are for treble instruments - flute, whistle, etc.)
CLOSE THE DOOR BEHIND YOU	12056	REEL	Dm	Inspired by a sign I spotted at the old Cape Cod Irish Village. I thought it would make a good tune title, along the lines of one of the reel titles in the O'Neill collections.
COOGAN'S BARN	12057	H'PIPE	G	This tune - which is intended to be played as a barn dance - was composed in honor of box player, session meister, IRTRAD poster, and all-around great guy Jim Coogan, who passed away in November 2007.
COTTAGE AT LARRAGA	12058	H'PIPE	Em	For many years, Mike and Terry Rafferty would tear themselves away from New Jersey's notorious summer weather to spend a month or so in Ballinakill, Mike's home town in Galway. (Larraga is a "suburb" of Ballinakill.) Not surprisingly there always seemed to be plenty of musicians around when the Raffs were there! Mike's been gone for a few years now but the sessions in "The Hill" and other venues in the Larraga area are still the stuff of legend.
COUSIN MIKE'S	12059	JIG	G	This tune was composed for "another" Michael Rafferty - not the late great New Jersey flute player - who was also from Ballinakill in Galway. This Mike was a singer first one I ever heard sing Michael Hogan's great ballad "Horses and Plough". I'm not sure how this Mike is related to "our" Mike the flute player, but I figure "cousin" is probably close!
COUSINS	12060	REEL	A	Named for a group of - what else? - cousins. I didn't have any close ones when I was a kid but my Dublin wife had loads of them. Some are still around, and she remembers them all kindly. I have therefore dedicated this tune to the Reid family of Dublin!
COW BEHIND THE FENCE	12061	POLKA	D	There's a very long story that goes with this tune involving musicians interacting with a cow - a Kerry cow, as a matter of fact. I'd be happy to share the details with anyone interested! Anyone? ANYONE??
CRANBERRY BOG	12062	REEL	G	There are a number of cranberry bogs here on Cape Cod which produce acres and acres of dark red fruit that can be used for all sorts of great things. A recent description of a cranberry as "a cherry that doesn't like you" is not entirely accurate but their tartness is definitely an "acquired taste"! Try a cranberry juice and soda for a great (non-alcoholic) summer drink.
CRASHING AT MIKE'S	12063	REEL	D	The Mike referred to is a Boston musician whose apartment years ago (when he was still single) was open to anyone needing a place to stay. Only 637 people knew where the key was hidden (but you were out of luck if you didn't know what a geranium looked like).
CROAGH PATRICK	12064	REEL	G	Croagh Patrick is the mountain in Co. Mayo where St. Patrick (according to the tradition) used to go to pray. It's a lovely spot and even now continues to be a place of pilgrimage for locals and visitors alike.
DANCING AT DAVOLL'S	12359	H'PIPE	G	Davoll's is a lovely pub (originally a "general store") located in a little corner of New England called Russell's Mills (part of Dartmouth, MA). The village and the pub itself would remind you very much of Ireland.
DAVE O DOCHERTY'S	12065	REEL	D	This tune was composed during the 1990 CCE North American convention in Saint Louis. It was named after the talented Mr. O'Docherty (RIP) whom I knew and respected for his various artistic abilities since the 1970's when we were both involved in New York's Irish Arts Center.

That rule however seemed to apply to new patrons only and didn't affect anyone already inside, who could finish their drinks in peace even if they couldn't expect any refills. Most of the places put out all but a few lights as a sign to the cops of their good intentions. I closed a lot of NYC pubsin my "younger" days and never failed to be amazed at how peaceful my native town looked by "dawn's early light"!
DEEP WATER	12067	JIG	D	This is dedicated to the local musicians who turn up to keep our sessions successful needless to say, I'd be in pretty deep water if they decided they wanted to be somewhere else! (Insert "gentle chuckle" emoji here.)
DEERING STATION	12068	REEL	G	Deering is the Chicago police station where Chief Francis O'Neill was in charge for
				many years. Jimmy Thornton, Al Purcell, and I tried to find it the last time I was in Chicago, but it appears that the Chief's police station is no longer there (or is no longer a police station, I forget which). The cops at the "new" Deering Station were very nice to us - Thornton flashed a badge of some sort so they knew we were okay but I don't think they ever really understood what we were looking for (and why)!
DELIA O'BRIEN'S	12069	JIG	G	Delia was the mother of Pat O'Brien, a Sligoman who was one of the session stalwarts here on the Cape. Her son was a fine box player and a real gentleman beloved of all who know him - Delia would be proud! We lost Pat in 2022 and he will be missed by everyone who knew and loved him.
DELIGHTS OF INCHICORE	12070	JIG	G	Inchicore is an area of Dublin's south side (i.e., south of the Liffey) that exudes its own peculiar charm but is not much visited by tourists. It sits on the banks of the picturesque Royal Canal, well known to yachtsmen the world over.
DENIS DONOVAN'S	12071	H'PIPE	G	Denis was a "jolly Corkonian" who left many friends in the Boston area when he passed away a few years back. His rendition of "The Boys of Fair Hill" was guaranteed to be a show-stopper (even the Dublin crowd liked it)!
DERRY LASS	12072	REEL	A	Dedicated to the memory of my great-grandmother Annie Gregg, who left Derry for Philadelphia when she was 19. She married husband Sam (of PA Dutch ancestry) and they raised a family in a tiny railroad town in central PA. "Mom" passed away in 1938, so unfortunately I never had the chance to know her.
DILLON'S OTHER BREAKFAST	12073	REEL	D	A totally unnecessary attempt on my part to immortalize my good pal John Dillon, a fine singer and instrumentalist who has been an important member of the NY traditional scene for many years. We go back to the early days of the trad revival in New York. John has a great memory for names and dates, so I'm thinking he could tell you all the sessions we ran or played at! The Dillon clan was like a second family to us - all great folks, bless their hearts!
DONNA SHEEHAN'S (A Reel Will Do No Harm)	12337	REEL	G	I composed this tune to keep up the spirits of the lady of the title, who was battling a serious illness at the time. She and her family fought the good fight, but sadly she never pulled through. She did get to hear the tune, however, and I understand she really enjoyed it.
DONNCHA'S	12074	SLIDE	D	This is dedicated to dancing master extraordinaire Donncha O Múinecháin, who left the Irish traditional world all too suddenly in January 2005. DUN AN UCHTA	12338	JIG	A	This is the Gaelic name for Martin Mulhaire's home town. I couldn't find a translation that made sense ("dún" = "fortress", "ucht" = "bosom", maybe here referring to some natural land feature where the "dún" was situated).
DUN LAOGHAIRE SAILORS	12078	JIG	Bm/G	My wife likes to check out a webcam that overlooks Dún Laoghaire (pronounced "Leary") harbor south of Dublin. The harbor is protected by a breakwater but when the breeze blows from the east or north sea conditions in the harbor can get pretty ferocious for a little sailboat. But that never seems to stop the intrepid sailors from heading out!
DWYER AND THE LEPRECHAUN	12079	JIG	G	"Dwyer" is Cork's own Richie Dwyer. The leprechaun thought to be his "accomplice" refused to identify himself or provide a DNA sample. According to the Bronx police report whole incredible incident involving an illicit gefilte fish factory, a 1987 Yugo, and several tall blonde women is still under investigation. New developments are expected "shortly".
E'TOWN PARADE	12080	MARCH	G	The Fourth of July Parade in Edgartown on Martha's Vineyard is a wonderful example of a small-town American celebration at its best. FERMANAGH'S LOVELIEST	12090	H'PIPE	D	Ireland certainly has its share of beautiful women (including the one I married). Most counties have a tune to proclaim this fact (e.g. "The Pretty Girls of Mayo") but since I couldn't find one for Fermanagh, I thought I'd compose my own! (The truth is that I couldn't find ANY tune with "Fermanagh" in the title, with or without the pretty girls.)
FIDDLE ON THE WALL (Larry Reynolds')	12091	REEL	Am	There might be people who have done more for Irish music in the Boston area than Larry and his family, but I sincerely doubt it. Irish culture in general, and CCE in particular, owe a large debt of gratitude to Larry for his untiring efforts on their behalf over the years. The "Great Music Hall" is long gone, although the building evidently still remains.
FIVE HOUSES	12096	JIG	D	A tribute to the fine musicians of Prince Edward Island in the Canadian Maritimes. It always amazes me that there's so much talent in such a small area! (And a special "tip of the hat" to Cape Cod's own John MacDonald, a fine musician himself, whose roots are from this area of Canada.)
FIVE LAMPS	12097	JIG	D	The "Five Lamps" refers to a part of Dublin north of the Liffey, not far from the Amiens St. train station. It's an area that has had a colorful history (to put it politely) but like many other Dublin locales, it has been "gentrified" quite a bit recently.
FLOCK OF BUDGIES	12098	H'PIPE	G	Anyone who may be interested in finding out more about the title of this tune is invited to find and watch a very funny movie called "The Commitments". Or you can just enjoy the tune with the knowledge that a budgie is basically a Celtic parakeet. (But it's still a great movie!)
FLY UPON THE BAR (Phil Taylor's Fancy)	12099	JIG	D	Phil Taylor is the man responsible for the "BarFly" ABC program that I have used and really come to appreciate over the years. He has been very patient with my questions and suggestions, and this tune is by way of thanks to him for that patience and for all the work he has done for ABC. FORTUNE COOKIE	12102	REEL	Em	Did you ever bite into a fortune cookie before you remembered there was a little strip of paper inside with your very own lucky number? The number that, if you hit it, would make you very wealthy for the rest of your life? On that little piece of paper you have now sogged up and made unreadable? But you could see enough to know that the first three lucky numbers were 5, 9, and 12, and those were the first three numbers of the five that won tonigh? And maybe the other two winning numbers were on that piece of paper you almost swallowed?
FRANKIE O'NEILL'S	12103	JIG	Dm	Frankie was the older brother and musical inspiration of the late NY fiddler Keith O'Neill, one of the founding members of the Northeast Ceili Band. Frankie passed away all too young a few years ago, and this tune is dedicated to his memory. (There's a tune for Keith in this collection as well.)
FROGS & SNAKES OF GALWAY	12104	H'PIPE	D	There's a very long and probably boring story that goes with the title of this little opus that involves a complete failure on my part to understand the name of a tune shouted at me during a session. Come on, help me out here - "Docks and Quays" CAN sound a lot like "Frogs and Snakes", right? Or maybe you just had to be there
GALWAY LADY	12105	JIG	D	Named for Anna Carew, mother-in-law of Northeast Ceili Band drummer Pat Reynolds and a true "Galway lady" who passed away a few years back. Pat and Maureen's grand-daughter Tessie does a fine job with her fiddle version of this tune!
GENE PRESTON'S FLUTE	12106	JIG	G	Gene was a flute player from Sligo who was part of the Boston music scene "back in the day". He was a member of the Connacht Ceili Band whose record is on my TuneVault website (www.capeirish.com/tune_vault#ccb). Gene's son Joe plays the whistle and was a regular at our local Cape Cod sessions for many years.
GENTLEMAN FROM CLARE (Jimmy Hogan's)	12107	JIG	G	Jimmy was a Clareman who graced the Boston music scene for many years with his fine whistle playing and stock of great tunes. He passed away in July of 2007 at the age of 91. (Thanks to Karin Joyce for the "Gentleman" name suggestion.)
GIRL FROM OLD BRIDE STREET	12108	JIG	D	Old Bride Street (as in "Bride Street, Old" not "Street of the Old Bride") is in the heart of Dublin's Liberties. My best pal (for the past 50+ years) grew up there. We went back for a look recently (June 2022) and unlike in other parts of Dublin, nothing much around Bride Street has changed (or at least not as much). I hereby dedicate this jig with as much love as I can possibly muster to my Girl from Old Bride Street!
GOOD SHIP ERNESTINA	12109	REEL	G	"Ernestina" (now officially "Ernestina-Morrissey") is a Grand Banks schooner with a long and illustrious history. For many years she was homeported as a museum ship over in New Bedford. She's just completed a lengthy overhaul and has returned from Maine to New Bedford to take up residence once again and do some coastal cruising in the Summer. My wife and I did a voyage from Boston to New Bedford on her a while back, and it was indeed an unforgettable experience.
GRAND BANKS	12110	REEL	A	This tune is supposed to have a kind of Cape Breton-y feel to it - I'll let you be the judge of whether I succeeded or not!
GRANDA QUINN'S WHISTLE	12111	JIG	D	My wife Pat recalls that when she was a little girl in Dublin, she would dance to the music of her grandad's whistle. Maybe this tune sounds like one that Granda John Quinn used to play for her!
GRANNY QUINN'S	12112	REEL	D	My very first composing effort. Named for my late grandmother-in-law, whom I never had the privilege of meeting but who was by all accounts a very special lady! Jerry O'Sullivan does a great job on this, and it was actually recorded by Solas. Apparently it was a fixture in their concert repertoire, for which my sincere thanks to Séamus Egan and co.

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GREEN BRIAR	12113	JIG	G	This tune is named for the Boston pub which proudly hosted the longest-running (an
				most consistently respectable) Irish trad session in town. I'm pretty sure I was at the first one in the early 1990's along with Larry and Mike Reynolds, Joe Joyce, Jimmy Hogan, Fergus Keane, and a host of other "local legends". The session had a great run, but the pub was sold, and the last session held there, in November 2019. (I was a that one too). The pub deserved its great reputation, but you have to wonder if it would have survived the pandemic (as so many other Boston pubs didn't, sad to say)
GROGAN IN THE CORNER	12114	REEL	D	Dermot Grogan was a fine musician who was proficient on several instruments. He came to the New York area from Mayo some years back and quickly became a part of the local trad scene. He eventually returned to Ireland, where he passed away in February of 2006.
HALFWAY TO KERRY	12115	SLIDE	G	If you're halfway to Kerry, you might as well keep going (as the late Johnny Cronin might have said). My salute to the great people of "the Kingdom" and their wonderful energetic music.
HANLEY'S HOUSE OF HAPPINESS	12353	REEL	D	This tune is named after a Chicago music pub highly spoken of by Jimmy Keane in th liner notes to "Horse", his combination memoir/tune book that he so kindly shared with me. As an East Coast type I confess to knowing not much about Chicago pubs, but I couldn't resist the opportunity of writing a tune with this name. I have to ask him whether the pub is still around!
HAPENNY BRIDGE	12116	REEL	G	The graceful Ha'penny Bridge (a/k/a Metal Bridge or - God help us - Wellington Bridge is one of the landmarks of Dublin, beloved by tourists and locals alike. In the old days you would throw a half-penny coin off it for good luck. In these days of the euro, I'm not sure what you'd throw (and maybe you'd be arrested for "causing environmental discomfort" to dear old Anna Liffey if you threw anything at all. Safer just to take a few photos and a selfie or two.)
HAPPY HAMSTER	12117	JIG	D	Unless you have had a serious relationship with a hamster (or "cricetus aureatus" as preferred by those of us with classical training), you may never be able to appreciate the subtle qualities of this tune, or the fact that the Angel In Charge of Diminutive Rodents has a sense of humor. Unfortunately hamsters don't enjoy a long life span, especially if there's a "felis felis" (a/k/a/ "cat") in the family.
HAPPY VALLEY	12118	JIG	D	For what it's worth, I came up with this tune during the Orange Bowl game in January 2006, won by Penn State. "Happy Valley" is the nickname of the Penn State campus, located in a lovely part of central Pennsylvania.
HARRY'S GREEN SOCKS	12119	REEL	D	In my humble opinion, nobody who wears green socks can be all bad (UNLESS he [or she] wears them in public, with shorts and/or sandals, at which point no online mockery can possibly be cruel enough).
HERRING RUN	12323	REEL	Dmix	In several locations around Cape Cod there are herring runs, through which the fish travel on their ancient journey between the sea and fresh water. When the time comes in the Spring, good folks are on hand at each run to protect the herring as they leave the sea to spawn. HIGH IN THE REEKS	12120	POLKA	Em	The "Reeks" are MacGillycuddy's Reeks tallest mountains in Ireland, located on Kerry's Dingle Peninsula between Dingle town and Tralee. You cross them via Tim Healy Pass or O'Connor Pass - both beautiful drives if the weather is right! (We've crossed the Reeks twice and were lucky 50 of the time.)
HIGHFIELD HALL	12121	REEL	Em	Falmouth's Highfield Hall was in years past the residence of the Beebe family, great benefactors of the town. In the course of time building fell into disrepair, but it has been lovingly restored to its former glory through the efforts of many hard-working people. It's definitely worth a visit if you're ever in this part of the world. To date we have done five concerts there, all well-attended and we hope as enjoyable for the audience as they have been for us. The Hall is a delightful venue that we look forward to visiting again.

I'll always remember the seamless transition from "Humors of Tulla" into "The Soldier's Song" (the Irish national anthem) after the local gárda stopped in around 1 a.m. to suggest - very politely but firmly - that we all might want to think about packing our tools away and returning to our respective dwellings. We did so without a word of complaint.
HORACE'S TWENTY	12326	H'PIPE	G	The "Horace" of the title is Horace Thayer, husband of Martha, a fine fiddler and one of our Cape Cod session regulars. Horace has been doing the Project Bread "Walk for Hunger" for forty-plus years. The walk is about twenty miles (hence the other word in the title) and Horace and his colleagues do it rain or shine. Over the years we have raised a few dollars for Horace (by playing tunes, not actually walking, which is too much like exercise for the average musician). Our session raised almost \$3000 for thi year's effort (2025).
HOUSE DOWN THE STREET	12124	JIG	G	Some friends of ours recently became house owners for the first time - a little scary because they had previously both been apartment people, and of course there's a world of difference in the two lifestyles (e.g., no superintendent to call when something goes wrong). But at last report the new homeowners were getting along fine (more or less)!
HUGH SMITH'S FAREWELL	12125	REEL	Am	Hugh was a Co. Cavan man who did a great deal to pro-mote the cause of traditional music in his adopted homeland - the USA. When he passed away, he left a great famil and a wonderful musical legacy behind him. (Hugh's brother Tony recorded this tune on the CD "Lamh ar Lamh".)

Joe and Willie Kelly - bless their hearts - took it seriously enough not only to learn it, but to make it sound good - no mean achievement! *** "Lanacane" is a rather obscure parish in South Louth famous (perhaps too strong a word) for its transient population of fruit bats. Apparently the place name derives from Gaelic "lán" meaning "full of" and "Catháin", a family name usually translated as "Kane". However no Kanes have ever lived in this parish, a fact which only adds to the romantic mystery that the local tourist board is desperately trying to generate.
HUMORS OF PLUMBRIDGE	12129	JIG	G	Plumbridge is a little town in the northwest corner of Co. Tyrone that's very special to some good friends!
HUSSEY'S PENGUIN	12130	REEL	D	The Shackleton Expedition to the South Pole in 1909 included a young man named Hussey. For reasons best known to himself, Mr. Hussey brought his banjo along, and he is responsible for the discovery that the sound of the banjo playing Irish music would attract penguins, while other types of "Celtic" music repelled them (no kidding!). Penguinologists and musicologists have been unable to make much sense of this (although Irish trad musicians might have their own theories). But - as they say - the research continues (or will continue once funding turns up).

After a couple of owner-ship and name changes, it's morphed into a "sports bar". Yawn sic transit etc etc. But thanks to Dermot, Tommy, and Joe for getting the whole thing started as the first trad pub on the Cape.
IRISH JACK DOHERTY'S	12134	H'PIPE	D	Jack Doherty was a well-known supporter of all things Irish here on the Cape until his passing in October 2006. He was also a dedicated member of several local veterans' organizations and had the reputation of being the man to talk to if you needed help of any kind. I'm sure his kind soul is enjoying all the tunes in Heaven right now!
ISLE OF THE BLEST	12135	AIR	A	Most cultures seem to have legends about a place where departed souls will find eternal happiness. We call it Heaven, but it's also known as The Happy Isles or Isles of the Blest. It's a beautiful thought and I can only hope it's where we're all going to wind up (even us banjo players).
JACK & ALFIE'S	12346	POLKA	G	Jack and Alfie are two young Irish lads who live with Mom, Dad, and their new baby sister in Trim (Co. Meath). We met them when we were back in Ireland in June 2022. They're great kids, and we hope one of them will be a musician at some point.
JACK HALEY'S	12136	REEL	Am	Jack was a Galway man, husband of the well-known Boston area dance teacher Maureen Haley. Jack passed away in January 2009, but Maureen is still going strong, thank God!
JACK MURPHY'S	12137	REEL	Dm	One of the first tunes I ever composed. Jack lived on NY's Staten Island (as we did at the time) and was a great lover of the music, getting to as many sessions as his job or a tugboat would permit!
JACK'S MAGICAL PIPES	12138	H'PIPE	D	There's a great story in O'Neill's "Irish Minstrels and Musicians" about a certain Jack Moore, a mediocre piper who became a great player after the fairies presented him with a new set of pipes. (There are different versions of this tale but, oddly enough, none featuring banjo players.)
JANEEN SULLIVAN'S	12139	WALTZ	D	Janeen was a lovely young lady who left family and friends behind far too early - I hope this waltz does justice to her memory.
JENNY PRIOR'S	12140	H'PIPE	D	For our County Meath grand-niece Jenny, husband John, and kids Jack, Alfie, and Rosie - with love and best wishes to all of them!
JERRY O'BRIEN'S	12141	REEL	D	This tune is named for the melodeon player (originally from Kinsale, Co. Cork) who taught Joe Derrane and other Boston musicians. JIMMY KELLY'S BANJO	12144	JIG	D	To know Jimmy Kelly was to love him (although it usually took a little time to get used to him!). His banjo style was a lively combination of Irish traditional and American jazz (similar to the Flanagan Brothers). There's a sample of Jimmy's incredible playing on my Tune Vault site (link below). I kept telling myself that I'd sit down with Jimmy one day to find out how he did it, but - as in so many other things - I waited too long. (www.capeirish.com/tune_vault#irish)
JIMMY MAC'S	12145	REEL	D	This tune is named for Jimmy McGreevey, a fine box player originally from Roscommon who has lived many years in Dublin. I always tried to get together with him for a few tunes when I was in town.
JIMMY THE BOX	12146	REEL	G	Dedicated to the memory of Jim Coogan - a/k/a/ "Jim at the Box Office" - accordion guru, session leader, IRTRAD poster, cheerleader for "Cherish the Ladies" (of which group Jim's daughter Mary is a charter member), and friend of anything to do with Irish music. Jim passed away in November of 2006.
JOE KELLY'S RETREAT	12147	JIG	D	The inspiration for this tune was the fiddling of Joe Kelly older of the two Kelly brothers (Willie's the other one) who have brought such great music into the world. Joe has for years been Father Francis Kelly and he's been too busy to do much fiddling!
JOE MADDEN'S BIG DAY	12148	REEL	D	In February 1992 New York's traditional musicians and fans got together and held a day of tribute for Joe Madden (RIP), Joanie's dad and a great player (box) in his own right. I was privileged to be present for a great day of music in Joe's honor. The event was held at Gaelic Park - then as now a good-sized venue - but there still wasn't enough room for all of Joe's friends!
JOHN EYRE'S CASTLE	12339	JIG	Ador	Martin Mulhaire's home town of Eyrecourt in Galway is named after Sir John Eyre, a 17th Century English adventurer (d. 1685) who was rewarded with an estate for his service to the Cromwellian cause. He also served as Mayor and Sheriff of Galway City. The castle is now a ruin (and exists mainly to provide a title for this tune!)
JOHNNY BY GOLLY!	12149	H'PIPE	D	Fiddler Johnny McGreevy was one of the most respected members of the great Chicago trad music scene up to his death in 1990. His positive influence remains to this day as the musicians he taught now pass the tradition to younger folks. The title of the tune calls to mind one of Johnny's favorite expressions.
JOHNNY'S WELCOME TO HEAVEN	12150	REEL	G	This tune was written in memory of the great Kerry-born fiddler Johnny Cronin, who passed away in February 1991 after an interesting (but not sufficiently long) life. Anyone who ever knew Johnny has at least three funny stories about him. Under a rough exterior, Johnny had a great heart, as his thousands of friends will attest. It was a privilege for me to have known and played with him. God rest his kind soul.
JOLLY OLD JIM	12151	JIG	D	There's an old codger who lives down the street who hates puppies, kitties, children poor, minorities handicapped, veterans, etc etc. And that's not to mention his darker side. But otherwise he's not a bad guy - honestiy!
JUNE BABY	12152	JIG	D	This is a birthday tune for Miss Catherine Sylvia-Everett, born to parents Colin and Elizabeth (and big sister Aubrey) on June 27, 2009.
KATHLEEN & CHRISTY'S (The Carndonagh)	12347	WALTZ	D	For two of the nicest folks I know - my Dublin brother and sister-in-law Kathleen and Christy Rogers. After many years apart, we saw both of them at a wedding in June 2022. Sadly Kathleen passed away in October of that year, so we were thankful to have spent some pleasant time with her. May her kind soul rest in peace.
KATIE'S GHOST	12153	REEL	Em	Our former home town of Falmouth is the birthplace of Katherine Lee Bates, compose of "America the Beautiful". There's a granite statue of her on the front lawn of the town library, and at night it's illuminated by a spotlight. We were having dinner in a pub across the street from the statue one foggy night when a young friend of ours glanced out the window, suddenly turned pale, and nearly choked on his burger. It took a few minutes for him to get his breath back after we explained to him what had been looking at. (Poor Katie DID look a little spooky that night!)
KAY O'BRIEN'S	12154	JIG	A	A jig in memory of Catherine (Kay) O'Brien, a great lady and great fan of Irish music who passed away in August 2009. It was comical to watch kids turning blue but still refusing to admit that they were freezing! We always had a great afternoon, but the kids are no longer kids and the house with the pool was sold 11 years ago. But we still have a lot of fond memories of those afternoons (and those kids!)
KILBAHA QUAY	12158	JIG	Dm	Kilbaha is on the Clare side of the Shannon estuary. Looking across to the Kerry side, you can see the famous "Cliffs of Dooneen" that the song celebrates. In the days of sail Kilbaha was the location where the Shannon river pilots would board incoming vessels, hence the title of the great shipwreck ballad "The Five Pilots of Kilbaha" ("the wind sang high on the rocky coast, to the dance of the restless tide"). The pilots still guide ships in and out of the river, but their boarding station is now upriver in Kilrush.
KILKEE FARMER	12159	H'PIPE	G	This tune was composed for my West Clare banjo colleague James O'Halloran. I met James at the Irish Embassy pub here on the Cape back in the 1980's, and for some reason I thought he was a farmer when he's actually a contractor. I decided to keep "Farmer" in the name anyway, since "Kilkee Contractor" didn't sound quite as "trad"!
KILLEEN'S OWN TOWN	12160	H'PIPE	G	This is a "tip of the cap" for a good friend and fine musician, Kevin Killeen, founding member of our Northeast Ceili Band and a great man for the tunes! (The town of Killeen - which can mean either "little hill" or "little church" in Irish - is in Co. Mayo.) It's always great to see Kevin, wife Maureen, and daughters Fiona and Grace up here on the Cape. (I keep hoping they'll relocate up here at some point)
KILMIHIL LASSIES	12161	REEL	G	Dedicated to County Clare's Millar sisters, Vanessa and Caoimhe, fine box players both, who will be adding a lot to traditional music in West Clare and elsewhere in the years to come.
KILNADEEMA FANCY	12162	JIG	G	Kilnadeema is a little town outside Loughrea, Co. Galway. Its main claim to fame is the fact that it's where Joe Burke and his wife Anne used to live (RIP Joe as of March 2021).
KING OF THE HILL	12163	JIG	G	This is dedicated to a friend of ours who managed to rise to a position of importance in local politics while also managing to remain a decent human being and family man. I wish there were more like him around these days.
KING OF THE KEYS	12164	H'PIPE	G	In honor of that finest of piano men and "gentle giant", the late Felix Dolan.
KINVARA SHORE	12165	SLIDE	D	Kinvara is a picturesque fishing town on the south- eastern shore of Galway Bay, right "around the corner" from Galway city. Since it's not anywhere near Kerry, it probably doesn't have any other slides (or polkas, for that matter) named after it. (Notice I said "probably" - anyway I couldn't find any.)
KITTENS IN THE TUNA FISH	12166	H'PIPE	D	This tune was inspired by Greg Johnson, a fine multi-instrumentalist who lives with wife Robin here on Cape Cod and runs the long-standing Saturday session at the Olde Inne. A great crowd even if they did occasionally ruffle some local feathers. But I think even the cops liked them great to be Irish! This titl was borrowed from the Police Log in our local paper - I thought it was too good to pass up.
LOUISE'S POLKA	12355	POLKA	D	For a lovely lady who loves her fiddle (and for husband Paul who loves the lady with the fiddle!)
LURGAN LASS	12178	JIG	Dm	Shaneen is a lovely lady from Lurgan, Co. Armagh, who has worked for many years at the Olde Inne here on Cape Cod. She got married in April 2008 and I wrote this to commemorate that happy event.
MAAM CROSS	12179	JIG	Am	Maam Cross is in Western Ireland between Galway and Mayo. It used to be off the usual tourist route years back but that's probably no longer the case.
MAEVE'S MAZURKA	12180	WALTZ	Α	For Maeve Flanagan, great daughter and musician (and friend!)
MALAMUTE'S FANCY	12181	H'PIPE	G	A malamute is a breed of "sled" dog that resembles a wolf. They also resemble the better-known huskies but are distinct in their physique and behavior. "Mals" are gentl and strong and more than a little bit independent. We shared our life with one for thirteen years, so we know! Believe it or not (and you probably shouldn't) they are also quite fond of set dancing and have learned over the years to compensate skilfully for the extra paws that most human set dancers don't have.

MARY JOSEPHINE'S	12184	H'PIPE	D	Composed to celebrate the young lady's arrival into the world. (I'm guessing she's probably around 25 by now.)
MARY O'CONNOR'S	12185	POLKA	D	Named for the lovely lady at whose Brooklyn apartment many folks once experienced that unbeatable combination - great music and great food. If and when I get to Heaver (not a sure thing), I will not be surprised to find that it bears a strong resemblance to Vince and Mary O'Connor's front room!
MAUREEN GLYNN CONNOLLY'S	12186	JIG	A	Maureen (RIP) was one of the fine teachers of Irish music who graced the New York area in the 1970's and 1980's. She was a talented performer on several instruments and many of her students - in New York and in Ireland - owe their excellence to Maureen's patience and teaching skills.
McFADDEN'S GRAND-DAUGHTER	12187	REEL	A	Inspired by "McFadden's Handsome Daughter", that great 3-part reel in the O'Neill collection.

I don't have room here to go into all the reasons why so many folks loved him - suffice it to say that he will be sorely missed, not only by his family and many friends, but also by all the musicians and patrons of the Olde Inne, where he served so many year as greeter maitre d', performer, and dispenser of sincere Irish hospitality. MIGHTY MIKE'S	12197	REEL	D	For Mike Reynolds, fine Boston box player who was one of the "charter members" of the Northeast Ceili Band.
MIKE FROM KC	12198	REEL	D	For Mike Dugger, stalwart of the Midwest trad scene who was a regular at Séamus Connolly's "Gaelic Roots" get-togethers. I haven't seen Mike recently but I know via his FaceBook posts that he's still active there in KC!
MIKE LYNCH'S	12199	JIG	Dm	When the Irish traditional music scene took off in New York in the early 1970's, one of the folks who was always involved in one capacity or another was Mike Lynch. Over the years he had relocated to the San Francisco area, and I lost track of him until I received news of his untimely passing in the Fall of 2009. RIP.
MILKMAN'S HORSE	12200	REEL	D	In the course of a conversation with a friend, he mentioned the fact that in his youth he had worked as a milkman's helper in the Bronx. Given his age chances are that he rode a truck and not a horse-drawn wagon, but I figured I'd keep "Horse" in the title anyway!
MISS BREEN'S HOTEL	12201	H'PIPE	A	This is named for a most interesting Dublin hostelry of days gone by, located in the City Markets on George's Street. The owner, a good friend of my mother-in-law, was a Quaker lady, and it was for this reason that the "official" name of the place included the word "temperance", implying that you had to go elsewhere for a drink. There was usually ample evidence - most noticeably around the breakfast table - that this requirement did not represent a huge imposition for many of Miss Breen's full-time residents. Miss Breen, her hotel, and all its denizens are part of Dublin's memories now - God be kind to them.
MOLLY WILLEY'S	12202	JIG	D	Molly, a regular at the Olde Inne Saturday sessions in days gone by, definitely qualified as one of Cape Cod's most enthusiastic fans of Irish music. She died in the Fall of 2009.
MONEYMORE	12203	JIG	G	The townland in Northern Ireland closest to my great-grandmother's birthplace. I was surprised to find no other tunes with this name!
MONSIGNOR'S POLKA	12204	POLKA	G	"Monsignor" is none other than Kerry's own Johnny Cronin (RIP). I'm not certain how he got the nickname - Johnny was certainly a great guy in his own way but you'd never mistake him for a member of the clergy! Everyone who knew him has a few stories about him, most of them true. (Check out the Cronin - Burke tracks on my Tun Vault site (www.capeirish.com/tune_vault) if you want a taste of Johnny's playing.)
MOONRISE	12205	REEL	С	The full moon of December - which the Native Americans referred to as "the cold moon" or "the long night moon" - was peering in the window as I began writing this tune. Bingo - a name! (Hard to believe how bright it was that night!)
MOUNTAIN FIDDLER	12206	SLIDE	G	Original title was "The Rushy Mount" but it changed after I came across a few other tunes with that title!

I've never thought of Irish music as fattening, but it surely was on lovely Wallace Avenue. MRS. FEENEY'S BLANKET	12208	JIG	Em	Sometimes new parents forget stuff, and then they need folks like Mrs. Feeney to help out!
MUSIC AT McGURK'S	12209	REEL	G	For John J. McGurk's pub in St. Louis, in years past a great spot for traditional music
MUSICAL CROW	12210	REEL	G	Crows were considered highly intelligent, magically gifted creatures by the early Celt and while I normally would never argue with such an opinion, I occasionally wonder: crows are so smart, how come none of them can carry a tune? NOT FAR FROM MEATH	12217	JIG	Am	I was surprised to find that in spite of its historical importance - e.g. as the site of the Hill of Tara, seat of the High Kings of Ireland - County Meath didn't have any tunes named after it. I can't imagine why, but in any event that situation is hereby remedied.
NUALA KELLY'S	12218	REEL	G	Nuala is the oldest daughter of Willie and Siobhán Kelly, a pair of excellent musicians who we have known for many years. We first made young Nuala's acquaintance when she was about two, and now suddenly she's grown up, finished college, and started her own family. REALLY???
OLD HEAD OF KINSALE	12219	JIG	G	The Old Head of Kinsale is a peninsula in south County Cork famed for its lighthouse looking far out over the Atlantic. Also looking out on the Atlantic - or at least a part of it - was the Kinsale Pub, located in Mattapoissett on the "South Coast" between Cape Cod and Providence. We had some great sessions there until it changed hands, and with new owners came a new name and focus that didn't involve Irish music. Too bad it was a great venue.
OLD MAN AND HIS DOG	12220	JIG	G	This is a familiar tune arranged as a jig (and with a second part added). It's dedicated to a couple of local characters of years gone by. (You can speed this up a bit and try it as a slide too.)
ORDINATION	12221	JIG	A	Catholics who care about the future of their faith bemoan the fact that not enough young men are going into the priesthood these days. We pray that situation changes soon. PARK ON SUNDAY	12226	JIG	D	Could be any park, any Sunday, but in this case Gaelic Park in New York in February 1992 for the big testimonial in honor of box player Joe Madden, father of Joanie and one of the really great guys in the trad scene of past years. "Joe Madden's Big Day", a reel that can be found elsewhere in these pages), refers to the same event.
PATRICK KEANE'S	12227	REEL	G	Composed in memory of Patrick Keane, Aughnish, Co. Clare, father of Fergus and grandfather of John, both for many years stalwart members of the Boston trad scene. Patrick passed away in November 1995.
PATRICK SCULLY'S	12228	JIG	A	Pat Scully and his wife Frances were regulars at the Olde Inne Saturday session from its inception until Pat's passing in early March 2009.
PATRICK'S PARK	12229	REEL	D	Patrick's Park adjoins St. Patrick's Cathedral in the Liberties of Dublin. It's a lovely quiet green spot in the middle of an otherwise typically hectic urban area!
PATRIOT SUNDAY	12230	REEL	Dmix	A large part of New England's population - including musicians, unless they're in the middle of a gig - is glued to the television on Sundays during football season. We're watching the Patriots, winners (to date) of six Super Bowls. Probably the best team in NFL history with the best QB (now retired) and coach (now coaching a college team). Lots of changes recently, not all for the best, but we're confident the Pats will be back in contention sooner rather than later!

PLANXTY PHELIM MEEHAN	12236	JIG	G	Until June 2006, Phelim was one of the co-owners of the Olde Inn, our Sunday session pub down here on Cape Cod. Both Phelim and Dermot (alv/a/ Filbert) Quinn were the perfect pub owners to play for - they appreciated the music but had no interest in telling musicians how to play it. What could be better? Thanks, guys! (Oh, yeah - they poured a pretty good pint too.) *** Update: Phelim gave up the pub business for a career as an EMT - big deal, rescuing folks, saving lives, blah blah blah - but you neve know when he might reappear behind a bar somewhere
PLEASANT HOUR	12237	REEL	Dm	This is named for a New York pub of bygone days called - optimistically perhaps - "Kerrigan's Pleasant Hour". According to Chief O'Neill's "Irish Minstrels and Musicians", Tom Kerrigan was a piper from Longford who spent some time in Chicage before heading east to New York to open his "free and easy" (the Chief's words), where Kerrigan himself was the main entertainment. We are not told when the place was opened, but Kerrigan died in 1901, evidently leaving the management of the place to his children. The Chief doesn't mention how long the place survived Kerrigan's death. Google (for once!) is no help, and I seriously doubt that there's anyone alive today who would remember.

Then covid shut down all the pubs and by the time it lifted owner had made other arrangements. Oh well The place hasn't changed much over the years (except the name - it's now "O'Shea's Olde Inne"). ROCK IN THE RIVER	12254	JIG	G	There's a river in Galway with the unlikely name of "Suck". In this river there's a magical rock that always remains above water no matter how high the river gets. Local tradition says that if the rock ever does get covered, it's probably the end of the world (or some equally unpleasant event).
ROCKCORRY DEPOT	12255	REEL	Dmix	Rockcorry is a town in Co. Monaghan that I had reason to believe (wrongly as it turned out) was the birth-place of my great-grandmother. The depot is the old railway station out in the country, now used by a local farmer for storage - the railroad is long gone.
ROCKS OF CONNEMARA	12256	REEL	Dm	There's no question that Connemara has a lot of rocks - in fact, it's famous for them. Folks come from all over the world to look at them and take selfies with them and generally enjoy their company.

ROSCOMMON PLUMBER	12257	REEL	D	Philadelphia had "the Cavan Plumber" - Ed Reavy. New York had a plumber of its own - the late Martin O'Grady from Roscommon. This tune is in recognition of his love and support of Irish traditional music in the New York area.
ROSIE CARNEY'S	12344	REEL	D	Composed to honor the arrival (in Trim, Co. Meath) of our great-grand-niece Rosie - third one in the family and named after her great-great-grandmother Roseanna (RIP) . We met young Rosie in June 2022 and can assure the world that she's a sweetheart!
ROSIE ROGERS'	12258	H'PIPE	A	This tune is named for my late mother-in-law, one of Dublin's fairest flowers and a resource for anyone wanting to know about Dublin in "the rare old times". I was honored to have her welcome me into the family. I couldn't have asked for a better mother-in-law!
ROXBURY RACES	12259	POLKA	G	Roxbury is the Boston neighborhood where many of the Irish and Canadian dance halls were to be found in days gone by. (Susan Gedutis Lindsay's great book "See You at the Hall" will give you all the details.) Roxbury is a center of the black community (it's now referred to as "Nubian Square") but I was surprised to see that Hibernian Hall is still there, although it looked pretty run-down.

SHANNON PILOT	12268	REEL	Am	When we were travelling in West Clare some years ago, I had the opportunity of taking a ride out on the Shannon River with one of the river pilots who was going out to board an inbound vessel. It was quite a treat for a ship enthusiast like me to be able to spend an hour or so on the "broad majestic Shannon"!
SINGING SISTERS	12269	JIG	G	For the Deck sisters, Rosalie and Rosamund - sisters by birth and sisters in religion - who were both fine musicians and beloved teachers at Sacred Heart High School in Kingston MA. May they rest in peace.
SIX FOOT SANDWICH (Loretta Egan's)	12270	JIG	D	The first time I ever encountered one of those notorious (but delicious) six-foot sandwiches was at a session at box player Loretta Egan's apartment in Manhattan many years ago. Other years we'll get blasted with two storms a week. Problem is that you can never tell which kind of winter it's going to be - the "Farmer's Almanac", Punxsutawney Phil the groundhog, and Brigitte the European Model are usually guessing the same as the rest of us!

Additional details are available (to adults only) upon request. STEVIE'S BOAT	12283	REEL	G	The Stevie of the title was an Inuit friend of Dave Macadam's whose boat was always at the disposal of visitors to the area.
STONEHILL FAIR	12284	JIG	D	Boston's Irish Fair - originally held at Stonehill College in Easton, now at the Irish Cultural Center in Canton - used to draw huge crowds every June. The Chieftains, Solas, De Danann, Cherish the Ladies, and other first-class traditional acts were cetatured (and appreciated) over the thirty-plus years of the Fair's existence. But it's been scaled back considerably in recent years - plenty of "Dropkick Murphy" wannabes, but not much trad music any more. Even the legendary "ceili tent" that provided 20+ hours of set dancing on a weekend is history: the ceili has been moved inside and runs one day for a few hours. Oh well great days while they lasted!
STROLLING WITH ROSIE	12285	JIG	A	This tune was written the day after we heard that our first grandchild McKenna Rose (a/k/a/ The World's Most Beautiful Person) had decided to start walking! Time flies (I just made that up!) and Rosie already has her own car yikes!
SUNNYSIDE UP	12286	REEL	G	The Sunnyside neighborhood of Queens in New York City has always attracted young people needing a place to live relatively inexpensively. It's a short commute by subway to mid-town and has a lot of quiet streets and well-kept apartment buildings that make living there a very pleasant experience. In years past, Sunnyside had a sizeable Irish population, second I would guess only to the Bronx in that respect. Of course things have changed a lot over the years, but I'm sure there are still plenty of Irish accents to be heard (along with many others) in Sunnyside even today.
SUNSET PARK	12287	JIG	G	Sunset Park is a neighborhood in Brooklyn not far from Prospect Park. It was always of mixed ethnicity when I was growing up a few miles away, and I doubt much has changed. Green-wood Cemetery, last resting place for more than one Irish patriot, is located to the area's northeast - a beautiful tract of quiet green in the middle of a busy city. ("Green-wood" - with the hyphen - is the correct spelling.)
SWANS OF GLEN LOUGH	12351	SLIDE	G	Part of the "Tracy Trilogy". The letters of the title (S, G, L) are for the three Gallagher kids - Séamus, Gráinne, and Lladán (in order of age). Glen Lough is in Donegal and probably has zero connection to the family beside the "acronymic" one!
SWEET SKIES OF LOUTH	12288	JIG	D	Louth is the county that adjoins County Dublin to the north. It seems to be a quiet county whose existence is often overlooked - for example, I couldn't locate any tunes that had "Louth" in the title. Possibly that's due to the fact that the word "Louth" is no particularly pleasant-sounding; the Gaelic version is "Lu", which sounds a lot nicer (and is easier to rhyme in both languages!)
TALL GREAT ARM (Tom Brady's)	12289	JIG	G	The G.O.A.T. Forever. Sorry, Mahomes.
TANGLED OWL	12290	JIG	С	The goddess Minerva's symbol of great wisdom got himself tangled in a car's ski rack a few years back. THIS is great wisdom?
TARBERT FERRY	12291	MARCH	G	Composed by "Pipe-Major C.Macdonald Frazier, 3rd Orkney Dragoons" News flash: there's no such person. If there is, he didn't write this tune. You know why I'm so sure? (And what the heck is a "dragoon" anyway?)
